Hobart Students Are Using READ 180 To Improve Literacy

READ 180 is an intensive reading intervention program that helps teachers meet the needs of struggling readers whose reading achievement is below proficient level. **READ 180 is research-based and proven.** The program directly addresses individual needs through differentiated instruction, adaptive and instructional software, high-interest literature, and direct instruction in reading, writing, and vocabulary skills.



In Hobart, READ 180 is being used with students in grades 5 through 12. The lessons that are followed by the teachers are focused on the needs of the students in 45 or 90 minute blocks. This is in addition to the regular literacy block. Doubling literacy time will build stronger readers and help students in every subject area.

There are several components of the READ 180 program including:

Software to build skills and provide practice in essential areas such as reading comprehension, fluency, vocabulary, phonics, and spelling.

Teacher-led instruction that combines an opportunity for direct-instruction and modeling as well as small-group instructional routines.

Audio books to allow students to read along with the help of a narrator and reading coach, who model strategies used by successful readers.

Paperbacks to allow students to select books to read independently. Students will have access to appropriate level, high-interest books.

Together all of these components will help build the skills to become a successful reader. Additionally,

studies show that the program also improves a student's motivation and desire to succeed.



Freshman Transitions

Since 2009, the Freshman Academies have created an environment where staff and students believe that academic success is possible for all. This belief has become what we call "Mission Possible."

Our high school orientation program begins in the 8th grade. A baseline of college readiness is established for every 8th grade student through the ACT Explore assessment. ACT Explore reports are presented to students and parents to help guide freshman programming. The Freshman Academy faculty meets with students and parents to discuss high school course offerings and program information. Our freshman core classes and elective offerings provide the foundation for a successful start to high school.

Within our Freshman Academies, our focus is on academic success, as well as the overall development of our students. Our services include freshman counseling, a freshman support period, peer tutoring, learning success skills sessions, and double-block course offerings in Algebra and English. In addition to our exceptional academic programs, we offer a wide range of extra-curricular activities and student recognition programs for our freshmen.

During the school year, students develop power skills such as time management and information literacy while they explore careers and plan for post secondary programming. All freshmen conclude the year with the ACT Plan assessment to measure individual growth and to determine placement into college and career programs based on college and career readiness.

Every student concludes the freshman year with a plan and pathway that includes rigorous high school programs and post secondary education and training. Pathways lead students to the best emerging careers. The Freshman Academies are committed to the success of each of our ninth grade students.

Our academic program allows students an opportunity to participate in a 21st century relevant educational experience. The school's academic learning goals guided planning of the high school which resulted in flexible learning spaces and wireless computing throughout the school to facilitate teamwork and encourage projectbased learning. The curriculum includes five schools for experiential education:

School of Communication and Fine Arts

School of Business Services and Information Technology School of Health and Natural Sciences School of Engineering and Industrial Technology

School of Human Services

By offering the core curriculum with a comprehensive set of elective offerings, students have the opportunity to explore new interests while solidifying a strong educational foundation that will allow them to be successful in a global economy.

Differentiated learning models and the use of digital content meet the unique needs of each student. A credit recovery program and alterative school setting have been established to meet the needs of students. Communication tools allow real time progress monitoring for students, parents and faculty. Hobart High School continues to evaluate opportunities for students to earn credit via dual credit programs.

Students are also assigned an advisor in their career field to help with college and career planning. ICAN commits professional time and resources for faculty training and collaboration on research-based instructional strategies, emerging learning technologies, and advisory.

Students are assessed on college and workforce readiness with various ACT assessments. The longitudinal data is used to measure student growth on college and career readiness.

Hobart High School students have college and career opportunities. The goal is to have all students participate in a program of study that allows them to receive job training, certification, and/or college credits prior to graduation. With Hobart's Advanced Placement courses, students will have the opportunity to earn college credit while taking a high school course. Hobart High School students will also have the opportunity to receive numerous college credits through dual credit opportunities.

The career pathways at HHS, including each school's specialized electives (School of Communication and Fine Arts, School of Business Services and Information Technology, School of Health and Natural Sciences, School of Engineering and Industrial Technology, and School of Human Services) along with courses from the Porter County Career and Technical Education Center, provide many prospects for earning college credit. These college equivalent courses are measured through midterms and final exams, which are under direct oversight of university faculty. Ultimately, the collaboration between HHS and university professors ensures the curriculum to be rigorous and relevant to students who plan to continue their education in the college setting. In addition, an expansive internship program has been established at Hobart High School. Students have the opportunity to receive real-world training in the area of their choosing. By exposing students to careers at a younger age, they are able to make informed decisions when selecting a career path. These career paths may or may not change depending on how the student feels after personal experiences in the profession. Additional partners include community agencies and businesses to challenge students to contribute to the economic and social growth of the community. Students also complete their high school careers by documenting their social impact on the local community through service learning.

Focus on the Future at HMS College and Career Readiness




Students are gearing up for high school and beyond at Hobart Middle School. It is important for students to know that it is not good enough to say, "Yes, I am going to college." It is easy to say and hard to do. Sometimes students begin planning for this endeavor too late. It is difficult for middle school students to realize that their choices <u>now</u> make a big difference for the future. Our goal is to give students experiences to help them start planning. Their job is to take these experiences and hold themselves accountable for their actions, especially in the areas of work ethic, behavior, and grades. There is no doubt students can succeed with "High Expectations and No Excuses!" Let's take a look at some of the life-changing experiences that Hobart Middle School students are receiving this year to prepare for high school and being college/career ready! **The "Focus on the Future" includes: 1. College is the smart way to go, 2. Push yourself, 3. Find the Perfect Fit, and 4. Put your hands on some cash.**

High School Preparation (Shadowing, Mentoring, Taking the ACT for College and Career Performance/Interests, Asking "The Expert" in Junior Achievement, and Playing the Game of Life in the "Reality Store")



A panel of high school students visited HMS students to help them get ready for high school. They described their daily schedule, their involvement in many high school activities and organizations, college and career plans, and what to expect when beginning high school. Every one of them stressed the importance of passing the ECA assessments in math and language arts. They also advised the middle school students to stay away from drugs and alcohol, go to class on time, and be good time managers so they can have fun while working hard. Many HMS students said they are planning to go to college, so they are going to have to work hard to be ready! It was GREAT to see how far our students at the high school have come, and encouraging to hear that anyone can succeed if they try hard. In addition, eighth grade students will begin shadowing high school students this spring! Each 8th grader will be allowed to spend a day at the high school following an upper-class student (many of whom are members of TeamLead) through their classes for the day.

Porter County Career Center and Local College Visits (Local Options Are More Affordable) HMS students are exploring the career center and local college campuses. The visits include the following: 6th grade students will be traveling to Purdue North Central in Westville and Valparaiso University this spring. They will be exploring the campuses and hearing from university representatives about the college environment, courses and credit, and what a major or minor is. 7th grade students visited the Porter County Career Center and Ivy Tech-Valparaiso. School leaders at the two locations met the students and took them on tours of the campuses. Students were invited to try some things at the Career Center—administering CPR, transferring electricity from person to person (shocking!), hammering nails into a wooden structure, and making videos! 8th grade students and their teachers will travel to Indiana University Northwest and Purdue University Calumet. Students will travel on school buses to visit the campuses and hear from university representatives about programs and majors offered. Yohan will be going along for photo opportunities.
