MISSING IMMUNIZATIONS

Over 250 students have not received their required immunizations for this year, and over 150 of those students are seniors. Seniors who have not received the required meningitis booster need to do so as soon as possible. Letters will be sent home soon notifying students that they will be excluded from school if they do not meet the Indiana State immunization requirements. This also applies to any other students who are lacking immunizations. Students can obtain these immunizations at their primary care physician, the health department, or the Brickie Clinic. Did you know?

Have you heard about FAKE? Spice? K2? These are just some of the names for synthetic marijuana. Smoking synthetic marijuana is a new trend for middle and high school students. While students assume that it is safe to smoke, it is more dangerous than regular marijuana. Marijuana is plant-based, but synthetic marijuana is a plant or herb that is laced with chemicals, and the majority of time the people smoking synthetic marijuana have no idea what chemicals they are inhaling into their body. Side effects such as high blood pressure, vomiting, blurred vision, hallucinations, seizures, anxiety, panic attacks, heart attack, and even death have occurred.
