



"Education Has Changed Since I Was in School"

Big Shifts in Learning: The CCSS Mystery

Do you remember what school was like when you were in kindergarten? Times sure have changed. It is common to hear parents talk how education has changed since they were in school. Children are learning at higher levels than in the past. Education continues to grow and help prepare children for the future. Most recently, Indiana along with 44 states and 3 territories adopted a common set of standards with a roadmap to learning for students, teachers, and parents called **Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for Language Arts and Math**. These standards provide clear expectations

for each grade level and are designed to be relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills for success in college and careers.

The School City of Hobart is following the recommendation given by the Indiana Department of Education to make the transition to these Common Core State Standards. **All grades** are learning the Common Core State Standards in **Language Arts this year**. **Kindergarten** and **first grade students** are learning Math CCSS in addition this year.

There are some **big shifts** with the Common Core State Standards. It will be important for **parents to be partners** with transitioning to these more rigorous standards. These are skills that will prepare students for college and career. See the big shifts below along with some tips for helping children at home.



Big Shifts in Literacy

- . Emphasis on Informational Texts
- 2. Literacy in all Content Areas
- 3. Text Complexity
- 4. Argumentative Writing



How do I help my child?

- 1. **Read** non-fiction texts *aloud or with* your child to learn information.
- 2. **Discuss** non-fiction texts and the ideas within.
- 3. Don't wait until the end to discuss what was read. Discuss thinking and ideas *while reading*.
- 4. Discuss the **evidence** that supports the thinking.
- 5. Have your child read multiple resources on a topic, gather information and compare the texts.
- 6. Read *challenging text* with him/her and discuss thinking.
- 7. Help your child *make connections* with what they read. What do they *already know*? How does what they just learned *fit* with what they already know? How has their opinion/knowledge *changed*?
- 8. Ask your child his/her **opinion** about various current events and have them explain their reasoning. **Debate** is a great way to enhance argumentative writing. The more children become comfortable debating verbally, the easier it will be to write in that way.
- 9. Give your child a **journal** for him/her to write in everyday to become comfortable writing.

- 1. Develop Speed and Accuracy

- 5. Use it in the Real World

How do I help my child?

- 1. Spend time with your child on **priority work**.
- 2. Help your child **memorize basic math facts**. The car is a great place to practice facts for speed.
- 3. Be sure your child is **practicing specific math facts** he/she doesn't know.
- 4. Have your child **explain his/her thinking and reasoning** for solving homework and real world problems.
- 5. Provide **TIME** for your child to work hard with math at home.



How Do Children Succeed?



In the book, How Children Succeed, author Paul Tough has identified a very different set of skills he believes are crucial to success. They include qualities like persistence, curiosity, conscientiousness, optimism, and self-control. Economists call these non-cognitive skills. Psychologists call them personality traits. Neuroscientists sometimes use the term executive functions. The rest of us often sum them up with the word character. As a dad, he explains what he has learned in the context of raising his own child in an interview, "What I'm more concerned about is my son's character. I want him to be able to get over disappointments, to calm himself down, to keep working at a puzzle even when it's frustrating, to be good at sharing, to feel loved and confident and full of a sense of belonging. Most



important, I want him to be able to deal with failure. That's a difficult thing for parents to give their children, since we have deep in our DNA the urge to shield our kids from every kind of trouble. But what we're finding out now is that in trying to protect our children, we may actually be harming them. By not giving them the chance to learn to manage adversity, to cope with failure, we produce kids who have real problems when they grow up. Overcoming adversity is what produces *character*."

credits while enrolled at Hobart High. She is currently attending Purdue University at West Lafayette and studying to become a veterinarian.







Project Lead The Way Biomedical

Hobart Biomedical Science students continue to thrive in the job shadow program with St. Mary Medical Center (SMMC). This is the second year of the mentoring program and students have greatly enjoyed their personal experiences with the staff and patients and have gained a better understanding of what it takes to work in a fast-paced facility such as SMMC.

These students are no strangers to the hard work and determination it takes to survive in a biomedical career track. Over the last four years, they have been participating in a nationwide biomedical science program offered through Project Lead the Way, PLTWTM.



These are highly capable students who have been engaged in an intense version of anatomy and physiology along with an aspect of inquiry and hands-on lab work. They have spent the last year learning about and designing possible solutions to some health care issues that we are faced with today. They have completed such projects as designing a new ER facility, completing an autopsy report, and developing an environmental health plan. To go along with their classroom learning, they have also had the opportunity to visit the St. Mary's ER facility and travel to Purdue North Central's cadaver lab.

These students are learning what it takes to survive in a rigorous and problem-solving based career field. With the biomedical field being one of the fastest-growing fields in the country, well-trained and motivated students will be a necessity.

Emergency Rescue Technology Academy

The Emergency Rescue Technology Academy (ERTA) currently trains 50 students each year from the School City of Hobart and Porter County Vocational in Emergency Medical Technician and Mandatory Firefighter Certifications through a Partnership with St. Mary Medical Center (SMMC) and Vincennes University (Project Excel).

These students are able to utilize the resources of SMMC while completing clinicals in the Emergency Room. They are able to actively participate in 3 to 4 times as many clinicals as other EMT programs at no cost to the schools. The students perform their Ambulance Clinicals at Hobart Fire Department, South Haven Fire and EMS, and Lake Station EMS. The students average 4 times as many clinical hours as other EMT programs at no cost to the schools or providers. The ERTA students attend the Cadaver Lab at Purdue North Central, a unique experience to the program, that is priceless in the educational process. The ERTA students are trained for the Firefighter Mandatory Certification through a partnership with DHS District 1. This training is provided at no cost to the students or schools and allows the students to wear fire gear, Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus

(SCBA) and attend the training center in St. John, IN with instructors from throughout Northwest Indiana.

These students have broadened their perspectives by participation in class and seeing so many entities that partner together to help them succeed.

Community Partners and Spirit Grow in the Teaching Garden




The Liberty students and staff were very excited to receive an American Heart Association Teaching Garden Grant. This grant, funded by a generous donation from St. Mary Medical Center, provided the materials and support to plant a vegetable garden at Liberty Elementary in May. A goal of this program is to teach students about gardening and healthy living. Many students have tried a limited amount of fresh vegetables and some think that vegetables only come in a can. Through participation in the Teaching Garden, the students can develop an understanding of how easy it can be to eat healthy fresh vegetables grown at home. Then the students can go home and inspire their families to also eat healthy and garden their own vegetables.

The Liberty students were involved in every step of their Teaching Garden. They built 7 raised bed planters and hauled 2 yards of planting soil to prepare for the planting day. On Planting Day there was a school-wide gardening kick-off and then the students went out to plant the garden. Johnson's Farms provided seedlings that helped the vegetables have a great start. Each grade level took turns planting, watering and adding worms to their designated planter. The students planted a variety of tomatoes, peppers, herbs, squashes, and other vegetables. At the end of Planting Day, each student took home a packet of seeds to plant at home as well. Several parents helped with the planning and the planting.

Over the summer, parent volunteers and staff members helped take care of the watering and weeding. When the students returned to school in August there were many vegetables ready to be harvested. Harvest Day was quickly planned. At Harvest Day the Liberty students watched a slideshow of Planting Day, thanked St. Mary Medical Center for their generous donation and then went outside to harvest the vegetables. After harvesting the vegetables, Liberty staff members and parent volunteers prepared the vegetables for cooking demonstrations. The staff demonstrated how to make Marinara Sauce, Grilled Vegetable Kabobs, Pepper Poppers and Pico de Gallo. The students were given samples to try and recipes to take home.

The Teaching Garden has done more for the Liberty students and staff than just teach about gardening and healthy eating, it has created a lot of school and community spirit. Next spring will be more exciting! See more on our web site under the Brickie Up tab!






